

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


#### **REMINDERS:**

## MAY 6, 2023

#### The Cruise

Is Mother Nature a "Miatas of Muskoka" member? Saturday May 6th's weather said "Yes!", as we enjoyed a perfect mixture of mostly sunny skies with a high of about 15C+ on that day!

A sub-group of our members met in Orillia and paraded into Midland to join the rest of us by 9:30 am at the starting point in the <u>Huronia Museum</u> parking lot (across from the <u>North Simcoe Sports and Recreation Centre</u> at 527 Len Self Blvd). This location allowed 28 members (including new members and guests) and their 15 cars (all 4

generations, in a rainbow of colours) to socialize and use the facilities. After our house-keeping meeting directions, a quick photo op, and CB's set to Channels 3 and 5 respectfully, we departed at 10:00 am.

Little Lake Park's calming water and scenery welcomed us, and we circled Midland to safely access Balm Beach Road and cruise through Perkinsfield, after which we were greeted by a breathtaking vista of Balm Beach and the Blue Mountains across the bay. Tiny Beaches Roads meandered through waterfront forested pathways past Cawaja Beach, Wahnekewaning Beach, and then the farmlands of Lafontaine. Lafontaine Road was a

quicker straightaway that ended in Toanche at Champlain Road, and a spectacular view of Penetang Bay. We followed Champlain Road into Penetanguishene for our bio break at the Community Centre, and then descended Main Street past their town docks (home of the World-Famous Dock Lunch!). Then we followed along Beck Boulevard, Fox Street, and Broad Street to enjoy the view from the other side of Penetang Bay. Fuller Avenue provided access to Midland Bay's scenic view from the north-west, and we circled Midland's waterfront counter-clockwise to arrive at

Tiffin Bay Parkette, where we followed Aberdeen Boulevard past Wye Heritage Marina. We arrived at our lunch destination Mom's Restaurant in Midland where 2 more members we able to join us. Although our noon arrival was about 30 minutes early for our reservation (and right at the start of their busy lunch time!), thanks to owner Louie and his team who were able to get us comfortably seated within about 10 minutes in our designated area. Their friendly team of servers and talented food prep staff expedited our diverse orders from the open breakfast/lunch/dinner









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menu, and delicious food arrived within a reasonable time despite some tables inevitably being served sooner than others. Thanks everyone for your patience! Meanwhile, we socialized with familiar and new faces, shared Miata stories, happily received our \$5 bills from Marina, and snapped up another photo op!

After lunch at around 1:30 pm, we headed east and north along Ogden's Beach Road, more winding waterfront roads through Midland Bay Woods, and into Port McNicoll's Paterson Park for a photo op in their waterfront parking lot. One of our guests, and then a local passerby, learned how to use Doug's camera to ensure all of us were included in those beach-front photos. We continued through Port McNicoll, past the docking site of the recently departed SS Keewatin, and





quickened the pace along highway 12 east to our ice cream destination at Mark's Ice Cream Parlour in Waubaushene (at the Esso parking lot intersection of highways 12 & 400). Thankfully there were enough treats to provide a satisfying dessert and farewell to our 2023 Spring Fling Cruise, where we enjoyed each other's company, Miatas, and some of the most beautiful roads and waterfront scenery in the world! 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## Tues. May 23 - Thurs. May 25, 2023

A small but intrepid group of 5 MoM cars gathered at Rotary Place in southwest Orillia shortly after 9 AM on May 23<sup>rd</sup>, in preparation for departure on our 3-day/2-overnight cruise to Niagara Falls and area. Participants on this cruise included Carol and me in the lead, Susan Wellman & Gord Bauldry, Diane Phillips & sister Gisele (guest), Mike & Cathy Fedorowich, Doug & Sheila Jackson, Garry & Patty Walker, and Claude & Shelley Mikolainis. After the usual greetings, bio-break and drivers' meeting, the group headed out by 9:20, under mainly sunny but very cool weather

conditions. We picked up 2 additional MoM cars at a crossroads gas station near the hamlet of Baxter, and our group of 7 cars proceeded on our planned "back route" across country southwest from the Barrie area toward our lunch destination. That route took us past Alliston, west through Loretto, along the scenic Hockley Valley to the outskirts of Orangeville, and southwest from there to the south end of Fergus, where we had an early Tim Hortons lunch. By the time we got there, the temperature had warmed to a very comfortable 20C.

We continued our post-lunch trek around 12:30 PM, skirting the north and west edges of Guelph via Hwy. 6 south to Hwy. 401, with a quick jog east on 401 to the continuation of Hwy. 6 south toward Burlington and Hamilton. Upon reaching Hwy. 403, which was extremely busy, we jogged a short distance east to the QEW, and "most" of the group then headed southeast on the QEW over the Burlington Skyway, and onward toward Niagara. I say "most", because, unfortunately, one of the group found themselves in the wrong lane to safely exit onto the ramp to QEW, as they were apparently boxed-out by the heavy 403 traffic, and forced to continue east on 403 toward central Burlington. Having no place on QEW to safely pull over and wait, the rest of us carried on; it was arranged via a quick cell phone call that the "stragglers" would meet us later at the hotel in Niagara Falls.









Thankfully, given the absence of any QEW traffic back-ups, it was an uneventful trip across Niagara peninsula to our Niagara Falls exit at Hwy. 420, and after a quick fuel top-up on Stanley Ave., we arrived to our hotel, the Comfort Inn Fallsview, at about 2:15 PM, and the other MoM car we had "lost" at the 403/QEW interchange in Burlington showed up about 10 minutes later. Total cruise distance for the day was about 300 kms, and total time "on the road"

was around 4.5 hrs. Our timely hotel arrival allowed us sufficient time to get checked-in and relax a bit, before 12 of the 14 of us headed out on foot for our walk over to the Niagara Parks Power Station, in time for our 4 PM guided tour (the other 2 stayed back at the hotel and relaxed in the indoor pool and hot tub.) Our walk over included a brief ride on the Niagara Parks Incline Railway which carries passengers from the Fallsview Ave./Stanley Ave./casino area down the escarpment to the vicinity of the Table Rock complex near the Horseshoe Falls. It was about a 15-minute walk from the bottom of the railway to the Power Station.



The tour of the decommissioned Niagara Parks Power Station was fascinating, very nicely showcasing the surprising sophistication – given its' construction almost 120 years ago, in 1905 — of both the engineering/technology and the architectural design of this original Niagara Falls power generation facility. Our group was treated to a very detailed and informative 45-minute guided tour and thorough explanation of the history and technology of this plant.

Afterwards, we were escorted down 180 ft. below ground (via elevator)

tailrace tunnel where

the waters diverted above the falls to turn the generator turbines in the plant had been directed back out to the Niagara River below the Horseshoe Falls. This former tailrace tunnel is 2,200 ft. long, and now provides a pedestrian link to a new scenic viewpoint out to the river close enough to the bottom of the Horseshoe Falls that the abundant spray in the air necessitates the wearing of a poncho (provided as part of the tour admission fee) in order to stay dry.




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Shortly after our return walk and Incline Railway trip back up the escarpment to the hotel, we gathered in the lobby and headed across the parking lot to our dinner spot, an Italian eatery called My Cousin Vinny's. Food was plentiful, and service to our group was cheerful (albeit a bit slow at times.) Everyone returned to the hotel with a full stomach.

The next day, after a hot breakfast at the hotel, we were "hosted" and toured around much of the eastern portion of the Niagara peninsula by several members of the Niagara Peninsula Miata Club. Led by Dan McNiven, their contingent included 5 or 6 cars. Despite the forecast of clouds and showers, the day started out mostly sunny. Dan met our group in the hotel parking lot about 9:20 AM, and after brief introductions and discussions, he led our MoM group of 7 cars to a staging area in a nearby golf course parking lot, where we gathered with Dan's fellow NPMC members, had a drivers' meeting to cover the day's cruise plan, divvied the combined group of 12 cars into 2 groups, and headed out on our cruise. The morning route included a nice riverside run down the Niagara River Parkway toward Fort Erie, then west and north toward St. Catharines, some scenic loops through the hills and forests of Pelham, Fonthill and Vineland, and ended up at our lunch stop west of St. Catharines. As the morning progressed, the sky darkened and the forecast showers did develop, but thankfully, they were very light and did not last long, and we were able to continue the route with tops still down.

Our lunch stop at 13<sup>th</sup> Street Winery included an interesting variety of offerings – aside from

the wines themselves, there is a wonderful bakery, a gift shop, an art gallery, and a seasonal bistro-style outdoor restaurant where you order at a counter from an interesting, eclectic menu, and food is delivered to your table on the patio. Dan had arranged with the owner for our combined group to eat in a private room indoors, which was just as well given the gray, iffy mid-day weather. By all reports, the food was excellent, and many in the group took full advantage of the bakery and gift shop offerings.













We departed for our afternoon cruise around 1:45, skirting the south and east sides of St. Catherines, and stopped by Lock #3 on the Welland Canal just in time to catch a large (740 feet long!) orecarrying lake freighter entering the lock. Seeing one of those mammoth ships up so close gives one a whole new perspective on just how large they are...and left me wondering just how powerful Lake Superior storms must be, to have broken up and sunk the similarly-sized Edmund Fitzgerald. The sky cleared and the sun came out as our cruise continued onward to an ice cream stop at the Avondale Dairy Bar east of St. Catharines, where most of the group enjoyed a very tasty treat from this famous local dairy and ice cream manufacturer. Then we headed northeast to Niagara-on-the-Lake, where we did a drive-through down the main street, and continued on, travelling south down the very scenic Niagara River Parkway, with brief stops along the way at the Brock Monument (Queenston heights), the famous Floral Clock, and the Whirlpool on the Niagara River. The combined group returned to our hotel parking lot at exactly the promised 4:30 PM, where we all said our good-byes and thank-yous to Dan and his NPMC club mates. Our total cruise distance for the day was about 180 kms, and our total driving time on the road was around 4 hrs.

After a quick trip up the street to top up fuel for the return journey home the next day, we all relaxed at the hotel, gathered in one of our rooms for some adult beverages and conversation, and then headed out for dinner shortly after 6 PM...this time, we took a short walk down the block to the chain restaurant TGI Friday's, where everyone enjoyed another filling meal. Afterwards, some of the group headed back to the hotel, and the rest of us took a short walk out to the top of the escarpment at the Incline Railway terminus, to take in this elevated view of the Horseshoe Falls (it never gets old!). Then, after a short walk back to the hotel,

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we turned in for the evening, after saying our goodbyes to Claude & Shelley Mikolainis, who were heading off on their own later the next morning to have lunch with friends.

Our last day of the cruise, Thursday, dawned bright, sunny and fresh. After breakfast, everyone gathered in the parking lot for departure by 9 AM, and off we went with our remaining 6 cars. For the return leg west across Niagara peninsula, we deliberately avoided the QEW, since we had no deadline to meet at the end of the trip. Instead, we took a more leisurely route on secondary roads (including Lundy's Lane, Hwy. 20 and Reg. Rd. 65), all the way across to the west side of Hamilton...encountering many traffic lights and stop signs along the way, but managing to keep the group together throughout. We then turned north, crossed over Hwy. 403, and eventually had our morning bio-break at a Tim Hortons in the

hamlet of Peters Corners, on Hwy. 5, northwest of Dundas. 
















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# Thursday, June 15, 2023 by Cruise Directors Rick and Shaun Fox

quail-, ties of vintage British roadsters, particularly the Lotus Elan, 'but endowed with modern Japanese quality and reliability, the Miata was both fun and affordable, with a base price of about \$14,000. Its

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1.6-liter, 116-horsepower inline-4 engine both looked and behaved like an updated version of the classic Alfa twin-cam 4, and its five-speed manual transmission delivered a precise and satisfying shifting experience. The car was a global hit, with Mazda building over 400,000 examples before the car was redesigned for 1999. First-generation Miatas are referred to as "NA" models, which were upgraded with a 1.8- liter engine in 1994. (Three subsequent generations have followed; the current-production MX-5 is the "ND.") Many Miata fans prefer the early NAs, as their lighter weight and quick- revving, 1.6-liter motors give the cars a purity that has arguably been



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watered down as MX-5 has evolved. Regardless, from a collectability standpoint, an original 1990 NA stands at the tippy top among regular production models. There

are, however, numerous limited-edition Miatas produced over the years, many of which included special paint colors. A turbocharged Mazdaspeed MX-5 was produced for two years during the second generation ("N B"), but most special Miatas were limited to cosmetic upgrades such as BBS or Enkei wheels, Nardi shift knobs and packages of optional equipment. Many of these cars can earn premium pricing in private-sale transactions among Miata die-hards, which is where they mostly change hands. It's only recently that we've started seeing Miatas making "real money," cracking into the \$20k range at public auction. At \$27,500, our subject car is among the highest sales on record, with only a handful of unmodified cars selling for more, the highwater mark being a 1993 Limited Edition with 8k miles that sold for \$36,750 on Bring a Trailer in 2020. With 28k miles, our subject car is a truly low-mileage car, although not "inthe-wrapper." It looks to be in impeccable condition save for an aftermarket stereo and shift knob. Its Crystal White paint is less common ~ and less desirable — than Classic Red. but with 24% of 1990 Miatas in the U.S. delivered in white, it is not rare. Just five years ago, you might have been able to buy a car like this for \$10,000. The market has escalated since. As with many driver's cars, the supply of better-condition examples continues to get used up. The Miata has become a rite of passage, a car that every enthusiast should own and experience at least once. Although ranked by production numbers as the most popular sports car of all time, great early Miatas are no longer so easy to find. The buyer here paid up for opportunity. He should still come out just fine when it's time to move on after crossing this one off the bucket list.

blue Canada flag in support of Ukraine, he points out.

And rounding out the car's extreme uniquity, an Alberta licence plate reading 'ORWELL,' in reference to the famous author of 1984, George Orwell.

He's a part of history too, quips Bedford.

"It all looks ridiculous from 50 feet away, but if you look up close, the artwork on each stamp is quite amazing," the civil engineering tech admits, admiring stamps of bridges on the trunk.

"I suppose I get some looks, but I have to

keep my eyes on the road. At gas stations, sometimes I get questions."

Each year, Bedford puts his Miata into a summer car show hosted by Wetaskiwin's Reynolds Museum, and he's part of an Edmonton-based Miata club.
